- Award the contract with a bid in the amount of \$207,002, including Optional Bid Item A; and
- Direct the Public Works Director to issue a contract change order to remove Bid Items 6, 8, 16, 20, and 23 from the contract, reducing the contract price to \$166,563; and
- Direct the Public Works Director to review the remaining contract elements and determine if further cost reductions can be made; and
- Approve a budget amendment in the amount of \$20,000 to cover the maximum anticipated contract costs.
- B. Consider a Resolution pertaining to the November 4, 2014, General Municipal Election by selecting one of the following recommended actions:

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

1. Adopt a Resolution calling for a General Municipal Election, and requesting the Santa Cruz County Elections Department to consolidate a General Municipal Election on Tuesday, November 4, 2014.

<u>OR</u>

 Adopt a Resolution calling for a General Municipal Election for the submission to the voters of a local ballot measure regarding an amendment to the City's Municipal Code pertaining to Visitor Services Fee (Transient Occupancy Tax), and requesting the Santa Cruz County Elections Department to consolidate a General Municipal Election on November 4, 2014.

### 6. ADJOURNMENT

Adjourn to the next Regular Meeting of the City Council on Thursday, August 14, 2014, at 7:00 PM, in the City Hall Council Chambers, 420 Capitola Avenue, Capitola, California.

vested in the City Council, shall be required to commence that court action within ninety (90) days following the date on which the decision becomes final as provided in Code of Civil Procedure §1094.6. Please refer to code of Civil Procedure §1094.6 to determine how to calculate when a decision becomes "final." Please be advised that in most instances the decision become "final" upon the City Council's announcement of its decision at the completion of the public hearing. Failure to comply with this 90-day rule will preclude any person from challenging the City Council decision in court.

### Dear Council:

We look forward to the meeting tonight regarding the McGregor lot use and while the topic tonight is to vote to move forward with selecting a contracting company for the project we would like to ask that you suspend a vote on the skate park pad portion.

As you know we have been working very hard on the skate park and our community deserves a park that we can be proud of and that will be the best representation of what we can build if given the opportunity. McGregor lacks support from the skate community due to the several issues that have been discussed over the past few months (safety to and from; parking, safety once there due to being so out of the way it lacks any visibility, etc).

We have secured private funding to produce a permanent, top-notch skate park at an alternative site. This funding will provide a park that is first and foremost SAFE in both its access to and from as well as visibility once there; this park will be of a size and scale that will be an enhancement to our community and be a park that Capitola can be proud of. The funding secured will only be considered for this alternative site and not for McGregor for the safety issues outlined above.

We would like to ask you to please remove Option A from the vote tonight when choosing to move forward with McGregor; please take the time to consider reviewing the proposal for the alternative site with respect only to the Skatepark portion; Allow us to present these plans and the backing for the alternative spot before deciding to move forward. Given that we are looking for a permanent skate park (McGregor is temporary) it seems only reasonable to explore all options before placing yet another 'temporary' item in our town - the skate park is out of the way - and has garnered little to none in community support. We only ask that you review the proposal before making your final decision.

AWARD OF CONTRACT

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:** Take the following actions:

- Award contract to Earthworks Paving of Capitola with a bid in the amount of \$207,002, including Optional Bid Item A; and
- Direct the Public Works Director to issue a contract change order to remove Bid Items 6, 8, 16, 20, and 23 from the contract, reducing the contract price to \$166,563; and
- Direct the Public Works Director to review the remaining contract elements and determine if further cost reductions can be made; and
- Approve a budget amendment in the amount of \$20,000 to cover the maximum anticipated contract costs.

**BACKGROUND:** On July 16, 2014, the City received seven bids for the construction of the McGregor Park Project. This project will complete the grading, fencing, landscaping, parking lot improvements, and related features of the park on the McGregor property. This project does not include construction of any of the feature elements which are skate park ramps, dog park, and bike park. These bid results are summarized below; the construction estimate was \$135,000.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The project bids are significantly over the construction estimate and budget. To reduce the project costs, staff is recommending removal of the aggregate base parking lot, concrete wheel stops, dog clean-up station, drinking fountains, and parking stall designations (Bid Items 6, 8, 16, 20, and 23 respectively). These changes will not negatively affect the final project and can be added to the site by the City if they become necessary. With the removal of the above bid items, Earthworks Paving remains the low bidder with a contract cost of \$166,563. A revised bid tabulation is included as Attachment 2.

Beyond the removal of the bid items, staff recommends the Council direct Public Works to seek other cost savings measures that may be possible to further reduce costs. Finally, the City recently was contacted by a resident, who has expressed an interest in fund raising for the skate park. It is quite possible that this effort could raise enough funding offset further reductions in the project scope of the project. Staff will advise the Council on this effort as the project moves into construction.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** \$165,000 has been allocated to this project. Of this amount, \$18,500 has been expended for a property survey, plan development and permitting. The remaining balance is \$146,500. While staff is confident that we can effectively reduce the project costs, a budget amendment has been prepared in the amount of \$20,000 to cover the maximum contract cost. The transfer will move \$20,000 within the Capital Improvement Program from the Utility Underground Project to the McGregor Park Project. The utility undergrounding project is not schedule until fiscal year 2016, which provides ample time to replace this funding.

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

1. Adopt a Resolution (Attachment 1) calling for a General Municipal Election, and requesting the Santa Cruz County Elections Department to consolidate a General Municipal Election.

OR

 Adopt a Resolution calling for a General Municipal Election for the submission to the voters of a local ballot measure regarding an amendment to the City's Municipal Code pertaining to Visitor Services Fee (Transient Occupancy Tax), and requesting the Santa Cruz County Elections Department to consolidate a General Municipal Election on November 4, 2014.

**BACKGROUND:** At the July 24, 2014, City Council meeting staff was directed to prepare a Resolution calling for a General Municipal Election and to include a local ballot measure regarding a TOT increase.

Currently the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) in Capitola is 10%, while the TOT is 11% in Santa Cruz and the County. If the second Resolution above is approved, a ballot measure would be added to the consolidated November ballot which, if passed by the voters, will increase the tax rate to 11%.

The City conducted a public opinion survey of 240 residents with the results presented to City Council on July 10, 2014. The survey asked respondents if they would support increasing the TOT to match the Santa Cruz City/County level. Overall 74% of those surveyed said they would definitely or probably support such a measure. Each 1% of TOT generates about \$126,000 a year.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The final deadline for the City Council to request consolidation of a local election for candidates and/or measures to the County Elections Department is August 8th.

There are two draft Resolutions before City Council, only one of which may be adopted. The first Resolution calls a General Municipal Election and requests consolidation with the General Election (Attachment 1). The second Resolution (Attachment 2) takes the same actions as the first, but also calls for a local ballot measure regarding an amendment to the City's Municipal Code pertaining to TOT.

If the second Resolution is adopted, which includes a local ballot measure regarding an amendment to the City's Municipal Code pertaining to TOT, the City Clerk will prepare a timeline for submitting the impartial analysis, arguments for and against, and rebuttals to the arguments. This information, as well as a Resolution authorizing certain Council Members to file written arguments for or against the City ballot measure will be brought back to the Council at a regular City Council meeting in timely fashion.

**FISCAL IMPACT:** If the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) measure is successful, the implementation of the new rate will become effective January 1, 2015. This measure is anticipated to generate \$126,000 annually in General Fund revenues. The City will be responsible for the printing and distribution costs of the measure's text in the voter information pamphlet, which would include the City Attorney's impartial analysis; and any arguments and rebuttal arguments pertaining to the ballot measure. The estimated cost to add this ballot measure to the consolidated election is \$4,800.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CAPITOLA AMENDING SECTION 3.32.030 OF THE CAPITOLA MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO THE CITY OF CAPITOLA VISITOR SERVICES FEE (TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX)

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF CAPITOLA, CALIFORNIA, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, it is the purpose of this Ordinance to amend the City of Capitola Municipal Code Section 3.32.030 entitled Fee/Tax Imposed, to increase the Visitor Services Fee (Transient Occupancy Tax) from 10% to 11%; and

WHEREAS, this Ordinance shall be known as the City of Capitola Visitor Services Fee (Transient Occupancy Tax) Increase. The City of Capitola hereinafter shall be called "City". This Ordinance shall be applicable in the incorporated territory of the City.

**WHEREAS**, this Ordinance is adopted to achieve the following, among other purposes, and directs the provisions hereof be interpreted in order to accomplish those purposes:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CAPITOLA AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1.** Section 3.32.030 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 3.32.030"
FEE/TAX IMPOSED

### Section 3.32.030 Fee/tax imposed.

A. For the privilege of occupancy in any hotel, each transient is subject to and shall pay a general tax in an amount of **ten eleven** percent of the rent charged by the operator. The tax constitutes a debt owed by the transient to the city which is extinguished only by payment by the operator to the city. The transient shall pay the tax to the operator of the hotel at the time the rent is paid. If the rent is paid in installments, a proportionate share of the tax shall be paid with each installment. The unpaid tax shall be due upon the transient's ceasing to occupy space in the hotel. If for any reason the tax is not paid to the operator of the hotel, the fee administrator may require that such tax shall be paid directly to the fee administrator. The general tax revenues shall be placed in the city's general fund.

**SECTION 2.** It is the purpose of this Ordinance to amend the City of Capitola Municipal Code Section 3.32.030 of the Chapter entitled Fee/Tax Imposed, to increase the Visitor Services Fee (Transient Occupancy Tax) from 10% to 11%; and

<u>SECTION 3</u>. This Ordinance shall be considered as adopted upon the date that the vote is declared by the City Council, and shall go into effect on January 15, 2014.
