I fear I have been away too much this summer and have fallen behind on the latest developments with my old friend, Village Parking. So unfortunately Friday's Agenda Packet release was the first time I saw the proposed Coastal Commission "suggestions" for requirements to be added to this ordinance. There are several items which I think might need clarification and I will outline them below. I hope you might postpone action on this ordinance for at least two weeks to allow for clarification and some additional conversation with staff now that these CCC requirements have been made public.

Sorry if this is a little lengthy but I wasn't sure cramming it into a 3-minute sound bite was going to work.

REOUIREMENTS TO MAINTAIN AT CURRENT LEVELS, EXPAND, AND/OR ENHANCE THE CITY'S FREE PARK AND RIDE SHUTTLE SERVICE.

The shuttle system was a requirement of the CCC in order for the City to create neighborhood permit parking programs. It is only required to operate during those times when the Neighborhood Permit system operates (basically during the daytime of summer weekends). The shuttle bus ride is free, but the City may (and did for a while) charge for parking.

The CCC's language above seems to imply BOTH parking AND the shuttle ride are to be free. If this were the case it would prohibit the City from collecting parking fees in PacCove when used as the base for the shuttle bus. This should be clarified to clearly state that the City can charge for parking in the shuttle bus lot.

Also this restatement of shuttle bus guidelines should be clearly limited to those days and hours of operation currently required by the CCC as a condition of continuing the City's Neighborhood Parking Program. Should, for example, the City eventually decide to voluntarily expand the shuttle bus program to operate daily during the summer, the City should retain the OPTION of also charging a modest fare to help defray operating costs and prevent abuses. The City of Santa Cruz charges 25 cents for their shuttle to defray costs and in part because otherwise homeless persons just ride it all day. Any expanded shuttle system should not be subject to CCC approval and restrictions unless, of course, the City attempts to expand its Neighborhood Permit System.

REQUIREMENTS TO MAINTAIN AT CURRENT LEVELS, EXPAND, AND/OR ENHANCE FREE AND LOW-COST PUBLIC PARKING ACCESS IN AREAS CONDUCIVE TO PROVIDING EASY ACCESS TO THE SHORELINE AND VILLAGE AREA, SUCH AS THROUGH EXPANSION OF THE PACIFIC COVE PARKING AREA.

Due to the high cost of developing additional parking spaces in PacCove and other places near the Village, the City cannot afford to create new parking spaces AND make them free. We need the revenue stream of parking fees to pay for construction. "Low-cost" is a relative term which needs to be quantified lest the CCC decide that low-cost must remain at 50 cents per hour. We need the CCC to give us a dollar amount for the upper range of "low cost" so that this threshold doesn't keep changing at the whim of various CCC staff persons.

There needs to be clarification if CCC considers the "current level" of low cost parking in Pacific Cove to be the 234 spaces in the upper level only or if they have already included the spaces in the temporary lower lot.

This also pretty much drives a stake through the heart of the future possibility of metering the 42 currently FREE parking space at the back of the Village along such streets as Cherry. While the revenue might not be needed today, someday metering these spaces could be a key component of the financing package for a future parking structure. Unhappy residents will clearly use this language to stop any such proposal since this is pretty much the ONLY free parking in Capitola Village. It doesn't seem reasonable or realistic for the CCC to require maintaining existing and adding more free parking in the Village. "Free" needs to be deleted from this requirement.

REQUIREMENTS TO REDUCE EXISTING NEGATIVE PUBLIC ACCESS IMPACTS ASSOCIATED WITH EXISTING PARKING ZONES, TIME LIMITS, HOURS OF OPERATION, FEES AND/OR STANDARDS (E.G., REDUCING OR ELIMINATING FEES IN CERTAIN AREAS TO OFFSET CHANGES ELSEWHERE).

Staff has maintained that time limits are not controlled by the CCC and that the City can change them without CCC approval (witness the current 2-Hour vs 3-Hour discussion). This requirement clearly shows the CCC will factor in time limits in deciding if the City is successfully increasing public access which is quite different from the needs of Village businesses and Village residents. Time limits should be deleted from this paragraph. In the meantime the City would be well advised to go slow in increasing the time limit to 3 hours or making other such changes until this language is clarified. You may never have the chance to undo a bad decision.

Every parking space in the vicinity of the Village is critical. It is hard to conceive how increasing fees in the Village, for example, could realistically be offset by reducing or eliminating fees in other spaces around the Village. Revenue streams are just too critical to financing any permanent parking solution.

It also appears to me that ANY in lieu fee program will have the inevitable effect of increasing the demand for public parking without actually providing any public spaces. Thus is fails to meet the requirement to REDUCE negative public impacts to access. Not looking good for in lieu programs.

OK. Those are the items which I think could use some clarification. Part of the problem is that not only will the CCC take us to task on these broad vague requirements, so will any member of the public who opposes any project, particularly a Village Hotel or parking structure. I hope you would consider postponing action on this ordinance for a couple of weeks to give additional time to answer these questions.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: 1) Appoint Kim Hogan as the Artist Representative to the Art & Cultural Commission (Commission), and 2) Appoint David Kraemer as the At Large Member to the Commission.

BACKGROUND: The Commission is comprised of nine members appointed by the City Council. The membership consists of one City Council Member, one Planning Commissioner, one Artist or Arts Organization Representative Member, one Art Professional, and five At Large Members. Commissioner Karen Nevis, the Artist Representative, resigned from the Commission on March 30, 2013, creating a vacancy.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: A recruitment was conducted to fill the Artist vacancy; however no applications were received by the June 7, 2013, application deadline. Staff extended the deadline and conducted outreach efforts to fill the vacancy resulting in two At Large Member applications being received. The Commission met on August 13, 2013, and recommended the City Council appoint Commissioner Hogan to fill the Artist vacancy with a term expiring on December 31, 2013, and to appoint David Kraemer to the At Large seat with a term that also expires the end of the year. Mr. Kraemer has lived in Capitola for the past seven years; in addition, his family has vacationed in Capitola for over 30 years. His interest in the Commission is to promote the Commission's value proposition by enhancing the resident/visitor experience and integrating art in all its forms into the daily experience. Through the Commission, he hopes to bring new ideas of community participation, as well as volunteering at established events to improve their success.

Assistant City Attorney Condotti stated that the City Council discussed the Capitola Police Officers Association, Capitola Police Captains, and the Police Chief's labor negotiations; there was no reportable action. 6. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Todd Guild, 1901A Courtyard Drive, stated concerns regarding a heritage redwood tree located adjacent to his property that might be affecting the structural integrity of his residence. He noted that the City had denied cutting down the tree on three occasions. He suggested that the City amend the municipal code to include a structural engineer to evaluate and report findings to the City regarding trees.

Peter Pethoe, Santa Cruz Hostel, suggested a hostel on the Rispin property.

Susan Wallace, Aptos resident, stated she opposes Wi-Fi due to radiation health effects.

Marilyn Garrett, Aptos resident, stated she opposes Wi-Fi.

Council Member Termini stated that the kiosk in the Esplanade was unveiled on August 7th; the August 6th National Night Out was a great event. He suggested that a larger US flag be installed at the Capitola pier.

Mayor Harlan announced that Ecology Action will be hosting free electric vehicle workshops. She stated that at a recent Santa Cruz County Sanitation District (SCSD) meeting she received information regarding a school program teaching children about living a earth-friendly life; the children are provided a book entitled "Journey for the Planet". She also stated that the SCSD reported on the purchase of signage for County sanitation trucks to encourage the public to not dispose grease down the drain.

City Manager Goldstein stated the Lower Pacific Cove Parking Lot Project needs to be rebid; therefore, the October 13th event to close the Esplanade to vehicle traffic is cancelled because the event was contingent upon completion of the Lower Pacific Cove Parking Lot.

10. GENERAL GOVERNMENT / PUBLIC HEARINGS

A. Request for a Coastal Development Permit and a Vesting Tentative Map to allow the Surf and Sand Mobile Home Park to convert to an owner-occupied park.

Kim Tschantz, Cypress Environmental & Land Use Planning, stated that this item is regarding the conversion of the Surf and Sand Mobile Home Park (MHP) from space rentals to an owner-occupied park, and requires approval of a Subdivision Permit and a Coastal Development Permit.

Council Members shared concerns regarding infrastructure improvements being required prior to the conversion of the MHP.

Mark Alpert, Attorney (Hart, King & Coldren), provided a summary of the project. He stated that the proposed subdivision will not affect the current leases.

Robert Dewitt, Civil Engineer representing the applicant, provide an overview of the project regarding infrastructure.

Council Member Norton requested that all encroachments on the Union Pacific Railroad right-of-way corridor be removed as a condition of approval.

Sandy Williams, Surf and Sand Homeowners Association President, provided comments regarding the poor condition of the MHP's infrastructure.

Veronica Shepardson, local resident, stated her support in subdividing the property.

Mark Alpert, Attorney, confirmed that all infrastructure improvements will be completed prior to sell of the lots. He stated that the DRE (Department of Real Estate) process requires that all information be disclosed to residents before they purchase the lots.

Michele Newbee, local resident, stated concerns regarding the poor appearance of the MHP.

Motion made by Council Member Termini, seconded by Council Member Norton, to find the proposed project exempt from CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines 15301; adopt Resolution No. 3962 for approval of the Vesting Tentative Map to subdivide APN 34-551-01 into 73 lots and 4 common owned lots; and approve the Coastal Development Permit for the conversion of Surf and Sand Mobile Home Park (MHP) from a rental MHP on a single parcel to an owner occupied MHP with each dwelling on a separate parcel; approval that the finding that the Mello Act does not apply to this project and is subject to the recommended conditions of approval with the addition of following conditions: (Condition No. 2) Nothing contained herein shall affect the validity of any existing lease between the applicant and any tenant who elects not to purchase their lot. nor shall this action be deemed to modify or otherwise affect the validity of any settlement agreement between City and applicant; (Condition No. 5) to include that prior to recordation of the Final Map staff will review the Convents, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&Rs) to ensure compliance with applicable laws and regulations; (Condition No. 8) Prior to listing any individual lot for sale with physical encroachments within the rail right-ofway, said encroachments shall be removed. The motion carried on the following vote: AYES: Council Member Norton, Council Member Storey, Council Member Termini, and Council Member Bottorff, NOES: Mayor Harlan, ABSENT: None. ABSTAIN: None.

BACKGROUND: Annual review and update of the Schedule is necessary to incorporate ordinances applicable in keeping the Schedule current and clearly defined for the Santa Cruz County Court database and for the City's Police Department in processing citations of Municipal Code offenders.

WHEREAS, State law provides in Vehicle Code Section 40203.5 that cities establish the amount of parking penalties; and

WHEREAS, State law authorizes the City to recover administrative fees, process service fees, fees and collection costs related to civil debt collection, late payment penalties and other related charges; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of California has signed Senate Bill 857 increasing the amount of parking penalties paid to the State by \$3.00 beginning December 7, 2010; and

WHEREAS, this State mandated cost to the City would amount to an estimated \$31,203 per year; and

WHEREAS, the City faces an ongoing operating deficit and in order to cover this increased State cost for future parking violations must increase its parking fines by \$3.00 per parking offense to reduce current and future budget needs; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to amend the City's current parking penalty resolutions in order to reflect the current State mandated surcharge for parking violations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Capitola as follows:

- 1. Resolution No. 3744 is hereby repealed in its entirety.
- 2. The City of Capitola hereby establishes parking penalties for parking violations, late payment penalties, administrative fees and other charges as set forth in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein.

SUBJECT: CONSIDER APPOINTING A CITY TREASURER TO SERVE UNTIL DECEMBER 2016

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Appoint a City Treasurer to fill a vacancy for the remaining term of the former Treasurer ending in December 2016; or

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: On July 10, 2013, the elected City Treasurer announced her resignation, effective July 15, 2013. Pursuant to Government Code § 36512(b) the Council shall, within 60 days from the commencement of the vacancy (September 13, 2013), either fill the vacancy by appointment or call a special election. The person appointed/elected to fill a vacancy holds office for the unexpired term of the former incumbent (December 2016).

At the July 25, 2013, City Council meeting the Council provided direction to advertise for prospective applicants to apply to fill the vacancy for the remaining term. Council also directed staff to prepare the documents necessary to elect a new Treasurer so a final decision regarding how to fill the vacancy could be made at the September 12, 2013, City Council meeting.

Staff has advertised for the Treasurer appointment by placing a notice in display cases and on the scroll, and posted the notice and application on the City's website. At the close of the application period, August 30, 2013, the City received 1 application.

At the July 25th hearing, City Council also requested staff to provide information regarding how many other cities have elected City Treasurers, and for staff to review the advantages and disadvantages of an elected versus appointed Treasurer.

Option 1 - Appointment by City Council

Staff recommends the City Council appoint the new Treasurer to ensure a qualified individual serves in the role, and to avoid costs associated with holding a special election. Staff recommends the City Council review the attached application to make an appointment [Attachment 1]. This recommendation is supported by the City's Finance Advisory Committee, who reviewed the options to fill the vacancy at their August meeting and unanimously supported appointing a qualified applicant to the position.

Option 2 - Voters to Elect Treasurer

As another option the Council may order an election in 2014 for the voters to select a Treasurer. Attached is a draft Resolution requesting the County Elections Department conduct an election at either the June 3, 2014 (Primary Election); or the November 4, 2014 (Consolidated General Municipal Election) for the voters to elect a Treasurer [Attachment 2].

If the Council decides to hold an election to fill the vacancy staff recommends that it be placed on the November 4, 2014, ballot to minimize the City's election costs. If Council decides on a June 3, 2014, special election, the cost is estimated at \$41,300.

Should the City Have an Elected Treasurer?

State law requires a general law city, like Capitola, to have either an elected or appointed Treasurer. The only qualifications in state law for the elected Treasurer are that the individual is over 18 years of age, a registered voter and resident in the City. Switching from an elected Treasurer to an appointed Treasurer requires voter approval.

Staff compiled data by surveying cities around the state to ascertain which cities have appointed/elected Treasurers. The result was that 264 of 403 incorporated cities in California (65%) have appointed Treasurers and 35% have elected Treasurers (currently 478 incorporated cities in California). The overall trend statewide has been that many cities have shifted from elected Treasurers to appointed Treasurers due to the increased complexity in government financial management, the high level of oversight by external auditors, and financial reporting requirements.

Staff contacted local jurisdictions to see if they have an elected/appointed Treasurer:1

- City of Scotts Valley appoints the City Manager/Finance Director as Treasurer;
- City of Watsonville appoints the Administrative Services Director as Treasurer;
- The County of Santa Cruz County currently has an elected Treasurer; however upon the incumbent's retirement the position will be consolidated with the Auditor-Controller position. The County Auditor-Controller is an elected position, which is fully benefited and compensated at a rate commensurate with other County department heads.

Some believe a publicly elected Treasurer provides additional oversight and increased accountability for the City. However there are several reasons this may not necessarily be the case.

For example, the responsibilities of a Treasurer are important and simply being a registered voter in Capitola does not necessarily qualify an individual for the highly complex role and responsibilities involving government accounting, financial markets, investment policies, risk mitigation, and records management. By some measure, if a Treasurer has limited understanding of City finances it may actually decrease transparency in that it may be less evident to the public how governmental financial decisions are made.

In addition, Capitola has a long history of citizen engagement and public oversight by the City's Finance Advisory Committee (FAC). The FAC is comprised of elected officials and community members that publically discuss and make recommendations regarding financial matters.

Should the City Council wish to consider transitioning the Treasurer from an elected to an appointed position during the City's November 4, 2014 election, the Council would need to adopt a Resolution to request such an election prior to July 13, 2014. The FAC has offered to study the option of transitioning to an appointed Treasurer and make a recommendation if so directed by the City Council.

FISCAL IMPACT: There are no direct fiscal impacts if the City Council appoints a Treasurer, or adds an item to the November 4, 2014 (Consolidated General Municipal Election). If the Council decides to hold a special election at the June 3, 2014 (Primary Election), the estimated cost is \$41,300.

CITY TREASURER POWERS AND DUTIES CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE § 41000 TO 41007

- 41001. The city treasurer shall receive and safely keep all money coming into his hands as treasurer.
- 41002. He shall comply with all laws governing the deposit and securing of public funds and the handling of trust funds in his possession.
- 41003. He shall pay out money only on warrants signed by legally designated persons.
- 41004. Regularly, at least once each month, the city treasurer shall submit to the city clerk a written report and accounting of all receipts, disbursements, and fund balances. He shall file a copy with the legislative body.
- 41005. The city treasurer shall perform such duties relative to the collection of city taxes and license fees as are prescribed by ordinance.
- 41006. The city treasurer may appoint deputies for whose acts he and his bondsmen are responsible.
- 41007. The deputies shall hold office at the pleasure of the city treasurer and receive such compensation as is provided by the legislative body.

2013 SLURRY SEAL PROJECT NOTICE OF COMPLETION

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Accept the 2013 Slurry Seal Project, constructed by Graham Contractors, Inc., as complete at a final cost of \$86,558.10, and authorize the Director of Public Works to release the contract retention of \$8,655.81 in 35 days following the recordation of the attached Notice of Completion.

BACKGROUND: Graham Contractors, Inc. has completed all work on the 2013 Slurry Seal Project. This project completed a slurry seal and restriping on Gilroy Drive, Riverview Drive, and all streets in Cliffwood Heights.

Council and staff have received both positive and negative comments regarding this slurry seal project from residents in both neighborhoods. The negative comments centered on the quality of the slurry seal application, mainly in the Riverview neighborhood. Staff has determined that the contractor met the project specifications and that the resulting product is consistent with industry standards. In response though, the Council and staff may want to consider other types of slurry seals for future projects.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The final contract cost was \$86,558.10 which included the cost of a contract change order that was issued due to the good pricing on the original bid. The final cost was \$606.10 higher than the amended contract amount. The increase was due to minor variations in quantities from the estimated amounts. A project cost summary is included as Attachment 2.

<u>FISCAL IMPACT</u>: The construction budget in the Capital Improvement Program was \$100,000. The remaining \$13,441.90 was used for patching failed asphalt prior to applying the slurry seal.

PUBLIC HEARING TO CONSIDER THE PROPOSED FEE SCHEDULE FOR FISCAL YEAR 2013/2014; AND A RESOLUTION REPEALING RESOLUTION NO. 3935 AND AMENDING THE CITY'S FEE SCHEDULE TO REFLECT STATE

IMPOSED FEES AND ADMINISTRATIVE ADJUSTMENTS

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Conduct the noticed public hearing on the proposed City Fee Schedule for Fiscal Year 13/14 and adopt the proposed resolution repealing Resolution No. 3935, and amending the existing fee schedule to waive the State-imposed Disability Access and Education Fee; and approve administrative adjustments.

BACKGROUND: The City updates the resolution setting fees for various City services such as planning, encroachment permits, use permits, and many other similar fees on an annual basis. Generally the updated fee schedule is effective on July 1st. Due to staffing vacancies within the Finance Department, the public hearing was delayed. State law requires the City to conduct a public hearing where testimony can be taken before any fees are added or existing fees are altered. Last year fees were maintained at the Fiscal Year 11/12 levels to provide time to review compliance with Proposition 26. Staff is recommending extending the current flat rates into this fiscal year, while the review process is being completed. The only proposed adjustments to the Fiscal Year 13/14 fee schedule include minor administrative adjustments.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The City Council adopted Resolution No. 3285 on May 22, 2003, which states that all flat fees listed on the fee schedule are to be updated in July to reflect changes to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the San Francisco, Oakland, San Jose area, with the exception of those fees that are established by law. Historically, the City has used the April CPI to determine July increases. In Fiscal Year 12/13, the Council approved deferring the 2.1% CPI increase to confirm compliance with Proposition 26. While the CPI index is commonly used to update fees, a periodic review is recommended to ensure that each fee does not exceed the reasonable cost of providing the service or program. The CPI increase for Fiscal Year 13/14 is 2.4%. While Staff believes all current fees do not exceed reasonable costs, staff is recommending deferring the combined increase until the review process is completed. It is anticipated this process should be completed within this fiscal year.

Drafts of the proposed fee schedules are provided in Attachments 1 and 2. Each schedule lists the current and proposed fees, with any adjustments highlighted in yellow. Last year, Council approved paying the State-imposed Disability Access and Education Fee on behalf of residents. This schedule continues to waive the fee. The original legislation required the City to collect an additional fee of one dollar (\$1) on every business license or equivalent instrument or permit, while remitting \$0.30 to the State. In Fiscal Year 12/13, the City remitted \$280 to the State on behalf of residents; and realized a reduction of \$747 in revenues that could have been applied towards disability compliance efforts.

The proposed fee schedule also includes the following administrative adjustments/corrections:

- Addition of a Private Tennis Lessons Fee, which is equivalent to 75% of the activity costs.
 This fee has historically been charged to participants; however it was not listed on the fee schedule.
- Deletion of a \$25 Pacific Cove Parking Lot Permit fee. The practice of issuing \$25 Pacific Cove Parking Lot Permits was discontinued prior to 2002; however it was not removed from the fee schedule. All current parking permit fees are in accordance with Resolutions 3715 and 3733.
- Deletion of the Mobile Home Park Administrative Fee as the program was dissolved in 2011.

All additional fees that are set by resolution, ordinance, or by State Law have not been adjusted, unless noted in these attachments. If Council chooses to add or increase fees, the attached resolution and fee schedule can be modified to reflect the adjustments.

FISCAL IMPACT: The fiscal impact from waiving the State Imposed Disability Access and Education Fee is estimated to be \$1,030. The impact of deferring the annual CPI increase is estimated to be \$16,000. This increase was not included in the FY 13/14 Budget. The proposed fee schedule will become effective September 13, 2013.

WHEREAS, the Government Code of the State of California, Section 66018 requires local agencies to notice and hold at least one open and public meeting prior to levying a new fee or increasing an existing fee; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Capitola has held a duly noticed public hearing on September 12, 2013, to consider increases to existing fees charged for various City services; and

WHEREAS, this fee schedule sets forth the City's cost recovery fee programs, which includes minimum deposits against which staff costs, adjusted for overhead, are assessed; and

WHEREAS, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 3285 on May 22, 2003, stating that all flat fees, with the exception of those established by law, shall be adjusted annually by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the San Francisco, Oakland, San Jose area, which was 2.4% for April 2013; and

WHEREAS, the City Council discussed CPI increases in conjunction with Proposition 26, and the deferral of the Fiscal Year 2013/2014 CPI increase that would be in accordance with Resolution No. 3285, to provide for a periodic review of the fee calculations; and

WHEREAS, the "Business License – Disability Access and Education Fee" waiver of \$1.00 has been extended; and

WHEREAS, the following fees have been updated to reflect administrative adjustments;

- Deletion of the "Mobile Home Park Administrative Service Fee" to be consistent with the 2011 elimination of rent control; and
- Addition of the "Private Tennis Lessons Fee" to reflect the existing practice
 of recovering 75% of the activity fee; and
- Deletion of the "Pacific Cove Lot Permit Fee" to be consistent with resolutions 3715 and 3733; and
- Merging "Police Reports" with "Police Copies of Reports" to avoid duplication; and

WHEREAS, the City of Capitola has made available to the public the required data pursuant to Government Code Section 66018 for at least ten days prior to adoption of a revised fee schedule.

ZONES [1ST READING]

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve for a first reading, the proposed Ordinance amending Section 10.36.055 as shown on Attachment 1.

BACKGROUND: The City Council approved amendments to the Municipal Code and Local Coastal Program (LCP) on December 13, 2012 to allow the City Council to approve modifications to parking meter rates and zones through the Coastal Development Permit (CDP) process. Previously, any changes to parking meter rates or zones required a LCP amendment.

<u>DISCUSSION:</u> The California Coastal Commission (CCC) considered the requested LCP amendment at its August 15, 2013 hearing. The CCC unanimously approved the LCP, but added modifications which require all CDP's authorizing changes to parking meter rates, zones, or other standards to include conditions of approval necessary to maintain or enhance public parking availability and coastal access. The following is the additional language proposed by the CCC:

All Coastal Development Permits that authorize changes to public parking zones, time limits, hours of operation, fees and/or standards that effect public parking use shall include enforceable measures (e.g. conditions of approval) necessary to maintain or enhance existing public parking availability and opportunities for public access to the shoreline and Capitola Village, where such measures may include but not be limited to:

- Requirements to maintain at current levels, expand, and/or enhance the City's free park and ride shuttle service.
- Requirements to maintain at current levels, expand, and/or enhance free and lowcost public parking access in areas conducive to providing easy access to the shoreline and Village area, such as through expansion of the Pacific Cove parking area.
- Requirements to reduce existing negative public access impacts associated with existing parking zones, time limits, hours of operation, fees and/or standards (e.g., reducing or eliminating fees in certain areas to offset changes elsewhere).

All such Coastal Development Permits shall be accompanied by substantial evidence demonstrating compliance with the above requirements, including evidence documenting the ways in which the enforceable measures applied maintain or enhance existing public parking availability and opportunities for public access to the shoreline and Capitola Village.

Staff recommends the City Council approve the amended Ordinance with CCC modifications because routine parking meter zone changes and modest meter rate increases would not typically impair public parking availability or coastal access.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CAPITOLA AMENDING SECTION 10.36.055 OF THE CAPITOLA MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO PARKING METER RATES AND ZONES AND AMENDING SECTION 17.46.090 COASTAL PERMIT APPROVAL

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CAPITOLA AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 10.36.055 is hereby amended to read as follows:

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A. Parking meter zones shall be established by the city council. Rates in the Coastal Zone will be established and/or modified by the city council issuing a Coastal Development Permit. All Coastal Development Permits that authorize changes to public parking zones, time limits, hours of operation, fees and/or standards that effect public parking use shall include enforceable measures (e.g. conditions of approval) necessary to maintain or enhance existing public parking availability and opportunities for public access to the shoreline and Capitola Village, where such measures may include but not be limited to:

- Requirements to maintain at current levels, expand, and/or enhance the city's free park and ride shuttle service.
- Requirements to maintain at current levels, expand, and/or enhance free and low-cost public parking access in areas conducive to providing easy access to the shoreline and Village area, such as through expansion of the Pacific Cove parking area.
- Requirements to reduce existing negative public access impacts associated with existing parking zones, time limits, hours of operation, fees and/or standards (e.g., reducing or eliminating fees in certain areas to offset changes elsewhere).

All such Coastal Development Permits shall be accompanied by substantial evidence demonstrating compliance with the above requirements, including evidence documenting the ways in which the enforceable measures applied maintain or enhance existing public parking availability and opportunities for public access to the shoreline and Capitola Village.

The city public works director, acting in the director's capacity as superintendent of streets, is hereby authorized to install parking equipment in conformance with the zones and rates established by the city council. The director shall maintain on file a map showing parking meter zones established by the city council. The city council, by resolution or minute order, may designate days when said parking equipment will not operate.
