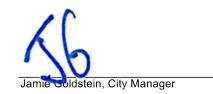

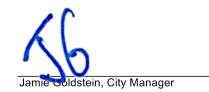

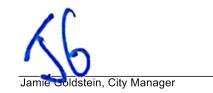

Dear Mayor and Councilmembers,

As members of the Capitola City Council, dedicated to the wellbeing of your community, you certainly understand what a vital resource our local libraries are for residents of all ages and backgrounds. Young children, teens, seniors – a wide variety of people and organizations -- rely on our libraries every day for information, education, connecting, and enrichment.

However, throughout our ten-branch Santa Cruz Public Libraries system (SCPL), the library facilities themselves are seriously outdated and inadequate. You know this all too well, with your own library currently housed in temporary modular structures, and the public eager for construction of a new library to meet 21st century needs. In order to continue providing services and respond to changing needs, libraries throughout the entire SCPL system must be renovated, updated, and in some cases even expanded or replaced

The SCPL governing board has placed a revenue measure on the June 2016 ballot to fund capital improvements to all our branches. Every penny generated by this local funding measure will be dedicated to improving facilities for the Santa Cruz Public Libraries.

As you may know, the public library system itself cannot pay for the campaign to pass this critical funding measure. **Our Libraries Our Future** is a committee of dedicated local volunteers, formed to lead the campaign to pass this measure so our libraries can continue serving our entire community for years to come.

A recent survey of local voters showed that there is significant support for the measure. However, we must run a strong campaign to receive the 66.7% support needed to win. To be successful, we must communicate with registered voters early and often through outreach, visibility, and a strong grassroots volunteer effort.

We are writing to ask for your organization's endorsement of this measure. Improved library facilities and expanded services will directly benefit our entire community, including the people your organization serves. We hope you will add your name to the impressive and growing list of endorsers for this measure. I am enclosing a fact sheet, draft resolution and response form for your consideration.

A Critical Community Resource

In Santa Cruz County, our local libraries are a vital community resource. Young children, teens, veterans, seniors and community members of all ages rely on our libraries every day to finish homework, apply for jobs and stay informed.

With many local schools closing their libraries, our public libraries are more important than ever in supporting the quality of public education in Santa Cruz County. Our libraries offer programs for young children and provide a safe place for students after school. Many local seniors and others on fixed incomes also count on our extensive collection of books, electronic media and online databases and regularly participate in a variety of community classes, programs and activities.

Local Libraries Must Be Repaired

In order to continue providing critical services to our community, our local libraries must be updated. Old, worn out, leaky roofs have ruined library materials and must be replaced. In fact, one branch's roof is over 50 years old. Additionally, branches have outdated boilers that need frequent repair and old bathrooms that need major renovation.

Access to the Modern World

Our libraries offer access to free, up-to-date computer technology, including fast and free wireless internet access for all. However, some of our libraries have electrical systems that predate computers and must be renovated to handle the high-tech needs of today's libraries. In our modern world, it is crucial that all libraries provide access to e-books, databases and 21st-century technology.

Local Funding to Protect Community Libraries

Santa Cruz Public Libraries has begun exploring various funding options to address these needs in our local libraries. While no final decisions have been made, the Santa Cruz Libraries Facilities Financing Authority is considering placing a \$67 million bond measure on the ballot in June 2016 that could be used to:

- 📁 Replace worn out, leaky roofs
- Upgrade outdated and inadequate electrical systems so that they are able to support the high-tech needs of modern libraries
- Provide space for young children and teens, including story time, homework and after-school programs and expanded collections
- Improve old bathrooms and replace outdated boilers
- 📁 Improve and expand libraries in underserved communities

BACKGROUNDER: Basic Facts about the Library Facilities Measure

THE SANTA CRUZ PUBLIC LIBRARIES SYSTEM includes 10 branches throughout the county, plus bookmobile services, community partnerships and a robust array of online resources. *The branches are Aptos, Capitola, Boulder Creek, Branciforte (Eastside SC), Felton, Garfield Park (Westside SC), Downtown Santa Cruz, La Selva Beach, Live Oak, and Scotts Valley.*

Our library system, operated by an agreement between the County of Santa Cruz and the cities of Santa Cruz, Capitola and Scotts Valley, is well-used and highly regarded by community members. It has steadily increased its collections, programs, technology and range of services in recent years. In fact, usage continues to climb among all age groups as programs and resources expand.

Unfortunately, our libraries' physical facilities have not kept up with the maintenance needs of aging branches, changing technologies, increased use, and inadequate space for both operations and programs. It's time to invest in the future of our libraries.

A REVENUE MEASURE HAS BEEN PLACED ON THE JUNE 2016 BALLOT to fund critically needed improvements at all 10 branches – to repair severe structural problems, update technology capacity, remodel spaces for increasingly varied activities, and expand or replace some sites as needed. Work will vary according to the needs of each branch, and plans for each branch will involve community input. The end result will be great libraries for all of our communities, meeting the 21st century needs and growing use by kids, families and community members of all ages.

The Library Facilities Measure asks voters to authorize a special tax, at the rate of \$49.50 annually per residential parcel, for issuance of bonds that will generate at least \$62 million in usable funds for public library improvements. It will require a 2/3 majority to pass. Planned library improvements include:

\$26,000,000 allocated to the County of Santa Cruz for the following

<u>Aptos</u>: Expand existing library to support growing use by young children, teens, seniors and others; upgrade 40-year old wiring that is completely inadequate for modern technology; complete other necessary repairs and upgrades. <u>Boulder Creek</u>: Replace aging roof; remodel interior for better flow and visibility; make necessary improvements to heating and ventilation systems.

Felton: Build new, 21st century library on donated land, moving from a leased building that dates from 1893, to support modern library usage for children, teens, residents of all ages, and community groups.

La Selva Beach: Improve layout to provide separate children and teen areas; upgrade antiquated heating and ventilation. Live Oak: Provide flexible program spaces and defined teen area; add library annex at Shoreline Middle School.

\$25,000,000 allocated to the City of Santa Cruz for the following

Branciforte: Restore meeting/study room; create defined teen area for homework and tutoring; replace old roof and heating. **Downtown**: Complete renovation and remodel, replacing antiquated heating system, 50-year-old wiring and failing plumbing; provide updated spaces to support growing use by children, teens, seniors and community groups. **Garfield Park**: Upgrade antiquated wiring; remodel for more flexible use of space.

\$8,000,000 allocated to the City of Capitola for the following

<u>Capitola</u>: Build new, 21st century library on existing city-owned land, replacing a cramped, temporary modular building, to meet the growing demand for modern library services.

\$3,000,000 allocated to the City of Scotts Valley for the following

<u>Scotts Valley</u>: Replace old, deteriorating roof; upgrade teen homework and tutoring area; provide sound reduction to distinguish quiet areas; re-orient entrance to future Town Center; possible expansion to support growing use by children, teens, seniors, and diverse community groups.

EVERY FACILITY WILL MEET THE STANDARDS OF A 21ST CENTURY LIBRARY: inviting,

welcoming spaces to meet a variety of needs. Each branch will offer access to technology, provide separate areas for children and teens, and establish flexible space for classes and community meetings. The Santa Cruz Public Libraries of the future will enhance Santa Cruz County's quality of life by providing vibrant spaces where people connect, discover and engage the mind.

Is this the business Council wants to rewrite an ordinance to accommodate? All the facts below can be verified by the Capitola Police Department.

<u>2014</u>

- (fact) Capitola Surf and Paddle Cited on 2 separate occasions for unauthorized signage. Advertising on the Beach using boards they use for their Stand Up Paddle Surf Lessons.

- (Fact) In July 2014, with <u>NO PERMIT</u> and <u>NO EXPERIENCE</u> Capitola Surf and Paddle began providing surf lessons in Capitola knowing a permit was needed to do so.

- (fact) Capitola Surf and Paddle Cited once (1) for providing <u>multiple</u> surf lessons without a permit. Capitola Surf and Paddle willingly lied during the investigation with the Capitola Police Department.



<u>2015</u>

- (Fact) Capitola Surf and Paddle received the 1st available Surf School Permit of 2015 without a single day of experience running or maintaining a permitted surf school and a citation for violating surf lesson regulations for providing unpermitted surf lessons after lying to the Capitola Police Department.

- (Fact) Capitola Surf and Paddle during 2015 was the only permitted surf school that chose not to communicate with any of the other permitted surf schools.

- (Fact) Eight (8) surf lessons (18 Students) provided by non registered surf instructor over a course of 8 months.

- (Fact) Six (6) surf school infractions after being warned by Sargent Dally in June 2015.

4.B

Below are 3 requests and recommendations. Enacting these will help to ensure public safety and that only the most qualified surf schools are awarded these valued permits.

Request - Increase the allowed surf school participants to 10. Increasing the number allowed participants is fair and reasonable since the Council increased the number of surf schools to 5. Increasing the number of allowed participants maintains public safety and the same student/instructor ratio.

Recommendation - I would like to see the council work together with the Chief to come up with a permit approval process the both can agree on for the 2017 permit approval process. Having both agree on the process will help to alleviate the undue frustration I believe the Chief felt during the February 11, 2016 council meeting.

Recommendation - If the supplementary questioner of the approval process, if it is to continue, I would like to recommend that the council and the Chief to updating the language of question #2 to read. "As a permitted <u>or non permitted</u> surf school have you ever received a citation for violating surf school regulations?" This will help to ensure that deceitful surf schools are properly evaluated. Character and judgment of each surf school should be a consideration for approval.

I would appreciate the council's consideration of these requests and recommendations. These requests will help to improve public safety and the surfing experience we all enjoy here in Capitola.

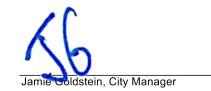

Dear Capitola City Council,

This submittal is an appeal of the Capitola Planning Commissions decision to grant a variance at 4980 Garnet Street for a garage addition to extend the garage six feet into the required 20-foot front yard setback. We have lived at the 4960 garnet Street for over 30-years and feel this variance would negatively affect the neighborhood.

- This variance reflects a 30% encroachment of the front yard setback, which is unprecedented in the 4900 block of Garnet Street. Currently the homes on this block line up visually as a result of the setback ordinance. There are only three properties on this block that do not meet the setback requirements and they are not comparable properties; 1) sub-standard lot with no garage 2) multi-family that has been existing for over 30-years 3) pre-existing single story.
- The approval of this variance is granting special privilege as the current lot and existing structure do support a new garage within the allowable setback without the need of a variance. Extending the first floor into the rear setback will gain the desired six feet of extra depth for the garage and would maintain the uniform and setback currently established in the neighborhood.
- Several of the neighbors within the vicinity are adamantly opposed to the variance as it will detract from the uniformity of the neighborhood and set a precedent within the neighborhood. We all disagree with the Planning Commissions opinion that bringing the garage to closer to the street will only 'slightly' modify the character of the neighborhood.

We are not opposed to the enclosure of the carport as long as it does not encroach upon the established setback. The neighborhood can be upgraded without impacting the neighbors or the look and feel of the neighborhood. As with any major remodel there are always trade-offs to be made, limitations to accept, and codes and regulations to adhere to. I'm sure that the property owners were never 100% certain that a variance would be granted, and so other building plans and budgets would have to have been a consideration and a reality.

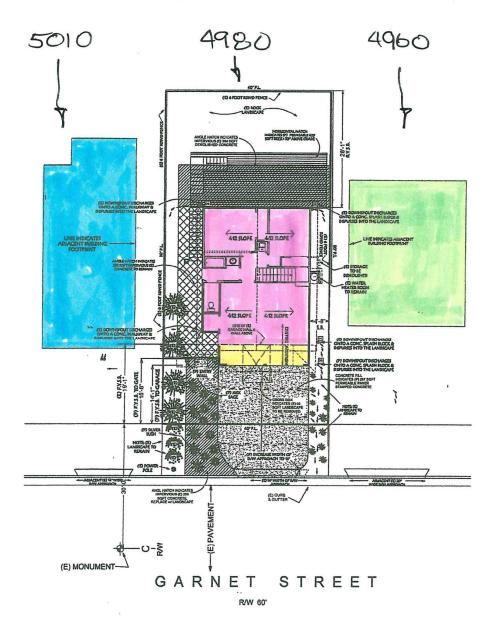

SUBJECT: Consider a Resolution Endorsing the Santa Cruz Libraries Tax Revenue Ballot Measure

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Adopt Resolution.

BACKGROUND: In order to continue providing critical services to our community, our local libraries are in serious need of repair. Several local libraries have 50-year-old wiring that is completely inadequate for modern technology. Additionally, many roofs are old, worn out, leaky and need to be replaced before library materials are ruined.

After engaging in a comprehensive facilities master planning process to assess the needs at each of our branches, including the Capitola Branch, the Santa Cruz Public Libraries found that a local source of funding is needed to upgrade, repair and modernize local libraries. On February 11, 2016, the Santa Cruz Libraries Facilities Financing Authority (LFFA) unanimously voted to place a \$67 million bond measure on the June 7, 2016 ballot to address the most urgent needs in our libraries.

DISCUSSION: Attached is a Resolution endorsing the June 7, 2016 ballot measure.

<u>FISCAL IMPACT</u>: If passed, the measure would provide Capitola with \$8 million to build the Capitola Branch Library. Those funds would be matched with \$2.6 million the City has already saved for the new library.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE LIBRARY FACILITIES REVENUE MEASURE FOR THE SANTA CRUZ PUBLIC LIBRARY SYSTEM TO APPEAR ON THE JUNE 7, 2016 BALLOT

WHEREAS, our local libraries are a vital community resource, providing a wide array of services and programs that enrich the lives of our community including young children and families, teens, seniors and people of all ages who rely on our libraries every day, and

WHEREAS, our public libraries are more important than ever in supporting the quality of education in our community, through programs that include pre-school reading readiness, homework help, a safe place to study after school, and access to computers for those who do not have them at home; and

WHEREAS, many local seniors and others with limited incomes count on our libraries' extensive collection of books, electronic media, and online databases, to meet their needs for essential information, entertainment and enrichment; and

WHEREAS, libraries have expanded their reach through partnerships with local organizations, offering community classes, programs and activities that include literacy, small business workshops, veterans services, creative learning clubs, senior programs and more; and

WHEREAS, our libraries offer access to free, up-to-date computer technology, including fast and free wireless access for all; but some of our libraries have electrical systems that predate computers and must be renovated to handle the high-tech needs of today's world; and

WHEREAS, our library facilities themselves are seriously outdated and inadequate, with each branch in need of major repair, remodeling, modernization, expansion or even replacement in order to meet the current and future needs of our community. Old, leaky roofs must be replaced; branches with outdated heating systems, old bathrooms, and antiquated wiring need major renovation; and

WHEREAS, in response to this need, the governing body of the Santa Cruz Public Library System has placed a measure on the June 2016 ballot calling for \$49.50 per parcel per year in order to generate funds for these needed improvements, with provision for an annual audit and independent citizen oversight to ensure that all funds are spent as promised; and

WHEREAS, the continued strength of our local library system and its facilities is vital to the well-being of a vibrant, thriving community that values knowledge, equal opportunity, and access to information, and this measure is consistent with the values and goals of this organization.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Capitola has voted to endorse the Library Facilities Revenue Measure and make its support publicly known.

SUBJECT: Consider a General Event Permit for a Fireworks Show by the Monte Foundation in the City of Capitola

<u>RECOMMENDED ACTION</u>: Authorize the City Manager to issue a Special Event Permit for the Monte Foundation Fireworks Show for Sunday, October 9, 2016.

<u>BACKGROUND</u>: In 2014, the Monte Foundation (Foundation) approached the City of Capitola to hold a Fireworks Show to benefit our local youth. This was a new General Event for the City that required a review by the City Council. Based on the review process, the City Council authorized the approval of the Special Event application. The Foundation held another fireworks event in 2015 after receiving approval of a Special Event application.

The Foundation has approached the City to re-issue its Special Event Permit for 2016. The proposed day of the week for 2016 will be on Sunday, the same as previous year(s).

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The Monte Foundation has conducted fireworks displays in Santa Cruz County for over 20 years. In 2014, the Foundation produced a Fireworks Show in the City of Capitola to help raise funds for the development of a Skate Park at the McGregor Property. The Foundation conducted another Fireworks Show in 2015 to help raise funds to re-surface the City's aging tennis courts. The Foundation would like to partner with the City to produce the fireworks show in Capitola on Sunday, October 9, 2016. The fireworks would be released from the wharf as done the previous two years. The show would be free to all attendees. There have been no significant issues associated with the prior events.

Road closures and alternate traffic routes will be similar to the previous events and will mirror the Wharf to Wharf event. All vehicle traffic into the Village will be closed one-half hour prior to the show to prevent cars from stopping in the middle of the road to watch the show and to prevent emergency accesses from being blocked. The Police Department may also consider closing Park Avenue 15 to 20 minutes prior to the show to prevent cars from stopping in the middle of the road to vehicle traffic. The middle of the road to watch the show. All other areas will remain open to vehicle traffic. The Foundation would be responsible for obtaining all the necessary permits from the state and working with the City on an implementation plan and Special Event Permit. The past two years, there has been no significant traffic issues associated with this event.

City staff has held discussions with the Capitola Village and Wharf Business Improvement Area

Committee (CVWBIA) regarding this event. Staff has discussed the proposed date with the Wharf Business owners. While they support City activities and community events, as in prior years they have concerns on the proposed day of the week. If the Fireworks Show is initiated from the wharf, it will require a full day closure of their businesses and in the middle of a three day weekend. The fiscal impacts to their businesses are noteworthy as weekend activities during the off season are important.

Last year's event saw an unusual and unexpected shift in the wind at the start of the display. This caused smoke and debris to float into the Jewel Box area causing concern to some residents. There were no reported damages to City staff. Staff discussed these concerns with the Foundation. The Foundation has agreed to monitor the size and impact of the show and the direction of the display to reduce the potential impacts in the future. The Foundation uses volunteers to assist with any cleanup efforts the day after the event.

<u>FISCAL IMPACT</u>: The costs associated with the event will be paid for through the Special Event Permit process by the Monte Foundation. The Foundation will also be responsible for all permit costs with other agencies. Funds raised by the Foundation will be donated to benefit youth or youth activities in the community.

SUBJECT: Introduction of an Ordinance amending Municipal Code Section 9.30.020 and Amend City Administrative Policy I-34, Section III (B) Regarding Surf School Regulations

<u>RECOMMENDED ACTION</u>: Introduce an Ordinance to amend Municipal Code Section 9.30.020 and amend City Administrative Policy, I-34, Section III (B) to permit five (5) Surf Schools.

<u>BACKGROUND</u>: At its February 11th, 2016 meeting, the Capitola City Council approved and adopted changes to Chapter 9.30.020 of the Capitola Municipal Code (Code) to regulate Surf Schools that operate at specific beaches and surf breaks within the City of Capitola. At that hearing Council directed staff to prepare an Ordinance change to allow a maximum of five Surf School Permits each calendar year. The City Council also directed staff to prepare amendments to the Surf School Administrative Policy I-34 (Policy) to ensure consistency between the Ordinance and the Policy.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The Police Department is charged with the issuance of Surf School Permits in accordance with the City's Municipal Cod and the adopted Policy. Applications are received and reviewed. Permits are valid for one calendar year beginning January 1st and expiring on December 31st of the same year they were issued. The time period to submit a completed application for the upcoming permit year starts December 1st and closes at noon on December 31st. Applications are reviewed by the Chief of Police who issues permits based on a competitive assessment of the qualifications of the applicant.

Five applications were submitted for the 2016 calendar year and four applications were awarded consistent with the existing Ordinance. One of the applicants, Capitola Surf and Paddle located at 208 San Jose Avenue, did not receive a Surf School Permit. Upon being notified that they were not being issued a Permit for 2016, Capitola Surf and Paddle filed an appeal in accordance with Code § 2.52. The City Council heard the appeal at their February 11th meeting and directed staff to prepare the necessary Ordinance and Policy amendments to allow five (5) surf schools.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CAPITOLA AMENDING SECTION 9.30.020 (B) TO THE CAPITOLA MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO REGULATION OF SURF SCHOOLS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF CAPITOLA AS FOLLOWS: Section 9.30.020 (B) is hereby amended to the Capitola Municipal Code to read as follows: "Chapter 9.30"

SURF SCHOOL REGULATIONS

Sections:

9.30.010	Application of Chapter
9.30.020	Surf School Regulations
9.30.030	Surf School Permits and Permit Fees
9.30.040	Indemnification

9.30.010 Application of Chapter.

This chapter shall apply to all surf schools that operate in the City of Capitola to the extent that they use Capitola beaches and surf breaks for which Capitola lifeguards and the Capitola Police Department have health, safety and rescue responsibility. Said beaches and surf breaks include Capitola Main Beach, Hooper's Beach, First Jetty Break, Main Peak Break, Hooper's Break and Toes Over Break, as designated on the map attached (Exhibit 1) to this chapter and incorporated herein. As used in this chapter, the term "surf school" is defined as any person, business or other entity, which, for compensation, teaches individuals how to board surf, body surf, boogie board or kayak surf.

9.30.020 Surf School Regulations.

- A. Student to Instructor Ratio. The maximum student to instructor ratio for surf schools while operating on Capitola beaches and surf breaks shall be 4 students per one (1) instructor.
- B. Maximum Total of Surf School Students/Surf Schools. The total number of surf school students using Capitola beaches and surf breaks during any single period of time shall not exceed 8 students. A maximum of five (5) surf schools will be licensed and permitted within the City of Capitola to conduct surf lessons on Capitola beaches each year.
- C. Surf School Instructor Qualifications. Every surf school instructor who uses Capitola beaches and surf breaks to instruct surf school students shall at a minimum currently have the following certifications and qualifications: Basic First Aid; CPR; Department of Justice (DOJ) Live Scan fingerprint clearance and criminal history check.
- D. Surf School Uniforms. Surf schools which conduct operations on Capitola beaches and surf breaks shall, while conducting said operations, assure that all students and instructors wear uniform shirts or vests identifying their respective surf schools. Said

shirts or vests shall be sufficiently distinctive in color or design so as to allow Capitola lifeguards and police officers to differentiate between surf schools. The City when issuing surf school permits may designate the color shirt or vest to be employed by a surf school for this purpose. It is recommended the surf schools utilize the same colored jerseys as assigned in the City of Santa Cruz.

- E. Surf School Equipment. Surf schools which conduct operations on Capitola beaches and surf breaks shall, while conducting said operations, use only the following types of equipment: soft foam boards with leashes for beginners; "hard boards" with leashes for intermediate and advanced lessons at instructor's discretion, provided that in any such "hard board" lesson session the student to instructor ratio shall not exceed two students per instructor.
- F. Surf School Insurance. Surf schools shall not be permitted to conduct operations on Capitola beaches and surf breaks unless and until they have provided to the City proof that they currently have in place liability insurance in an amount prescribed by City Council resolution as well as worker's compensation insurance as required by state law. Surf schools shall also have a safety and evacuation plan on file.
- G. Other Applicable Regulations. Surf schools that conduct operations on Capitola beaches and surf breaks shall comply with all other applicable federal, state and local statutes and regulations including but not limited to Capitola Municipal Code Chapter 8.64 pertaining to water sports and equipment, Capitola Municipal Code Chapter 5.04 pertaining to business license taxes and applicable California Labor Code statutes governing employment including statutes governing wages, hours and worker's compensation.
- 9.30.030 Surf School Permits and Permit Fees.
 - A. Permits. No surf school shall conduct operations on Capitola beaches or surf breaks without first obtaining a permit to do so from the Capitola Police Department. The permit shall assure compliance with the surf school regulations set forth in Section 9.30.020 and at a minimum shall specify the following:
 - 1. The maximum number of instructors and students the permitted surf school may have while conducting its operations.
 - 2. The specific locations at which the permitted surf school may conduct its operations.
 - 3. The type and color of uniform shirt or vest to be worn by surf school instructors and students.
 - 4. The types of equipment that may be used by the permitted surf school while conducting its operations on Capitola beaches and surf breaks.
 - B. Permit Fees. The Capitola Police Department shall assess permit fees to surf schools, which shall be due and payable in full at the time of permit issuance. The amount of the fee shall be set by City Council resolution and shall correspond to the costs incurred by the City in administering this ordinance, regulating surf schools in accordance with this ordinance and providing public safety services attributable exclusively to the operation of surf schools on City beaches and surf breaks. To this end, to the extent it is necessary for the City to employ lifeguards or other law enforcement personnel that would not otherwise be required but for the conduct of surf school operations on Capitola beaches

and surf breaks, as part of its permit fee assessment the City may recover from those surf schools on a pro rata basis the costs it incurs employing said lifeguards or law enforcement personnel.

9.30.040 Indemnification.

No surf school shall conduct operations on Capitola beaches and surf breaks without first executing an agreement to indemnify the City against and hold the City harmless from all claims for death, personal injury or property damage caused or allegedly caused by the surf school's operations. The indemnification/hold harmless agreement shall be in a form approved by the City Attorney. Surf school liability insurance procured by surf schools to comply with Section 9.30.020(G) shall name the City as an additional insured.

ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY

SURF SCHOOL PERMITS

PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to provide a process for the annual review and issuance of surf school permits that are issued within the City limits of Capitola, implementing Capitola Municipal Code section 9.30. Surf schools that are permitted to conduct operations on Capitola beaches and surf breaks shall comply with all other applicable federal, state and local statutes and regulations including but not limited to Capitola Municipal Code Chapter <u>8.64</u> pertaining to water sports and equipment, Capitola Municipal Code Chapter <u>5.04</u> pertaining to business license taxes and applicable California Labor Code statutes governing employment including statutes governing wages, hours and worker's compensation.

I. <u>POLICY</u>

No surf school shall conduct operations on Capitola beaches or surf breaks without first obtaining a permit to do so from the Capitola police department. The permit shall assure compliance with the surf school regulations set forth in Section <u>9.30.020</u> and other requirements determined necessary to comply with public safety and local, state or federal law.

II. **PROCEDURE**

A. The Capitola police department shall assess permit fees to surf schools, which shall be due and payable in full at the time of permit issuance. The amount of the fee shall be established in the City's fee schedule and shall correspond to the costs incurred by the city in regulating surf schools in accordance with this policy and providing public safety services attributable exclusively to the operation of surf schools on city beaches and surf breaks.

To the extent it is necessary for the city to employ lifeguards or other public safety personnel that would not otherwise be required but for the conduct of surf school operations on Capitola beaches and surf breaks, as part of its permit fee assessment the city may recover from those surf schools on a pro rata basis the costs it incurs employing said lifeguards or law enforcement personnel.

B. Permit Issuance. Permits are valid for one calendar year beginning on January 1st and expiring on December 31st of the same year they were issued. The time period to submit a completed application for the upcoming permit year starts December 1 and closes at noon on December 31st. Completed and submitted applications will be reviewed by the Chief of Police who will issue no more than <u>fivefour</u> permits based on a competitive assessment of the qualifications of the applicant, the applicant's past history of compliance with applicable regulations, the applicant's history of successfully operating a Surf School, and the City's adopted "Local Vendor Preference" policies. Those permits shall be valid for one year and may be renewed with a completed application during the application period upon a finding by the Police Chief that the permit holder has complied with their permit conditions and applicable law.

The Police Chief's decision regarding the award of a Surf School permit may be appealed by an affected party to the City Manager. The City Manager's decision may be appealed to City Council pursuant to CMC 2.52.

If at any time fewer than <u>fivefour</u> Surf School permits have been issued, the remaining permits will be issued on a first come first served basis to qualified applicants upon submission of a complete application.

E. Permit Term. Surf School permits expire on Dec. 31st of the year issued.

III. <u>REVOCATION</u>

The City Manager shall have the right to revoke or suspend Surf School permits for: failure to comply with the terms of a Surf School permit, failure to comply with applicable laws, and/or failure to operate a Surf School. The City Manager's decision to revoke a permit may be appealed to City Council pursuant to CMC 2.52.
