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FOOD WASTE COLLECTION COMES TO CAPITOLA

The City Council approved a commercial food waste collection system last October which began in early December. The program is offered to commercial businesses primarily restaurants and grocery stores. As part of the overall effort to meet the state mandate to reduce the amount of waste sent to the landfill for disposal and the City's goal of a 75% diversion rate by 2010, the City has been working with Green Waste Recovery to develop a commercial Food Waste collection program. Food waste typically constitutes approximately 20 - 30% of the commercial waste stream. Currently the City is diverting 67% of its waste from the landfill through a variety of recycling programs. A food waste composting program has the potential to increase the City's diversion rate beyond 75%, meeting the City's established target.

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The food waste will be collected by the City's hauler, Green Waste Recovery and brought to the Monterey Regional Waste Management District's landfill where they will compost the material.

The program will operate similarly to the County's food waste program, which was established five years ago. Green Waste will

provide the collection service and leak-proof containers for the customers with a pickup schedule up to three times per week. For more information on how you can participate, please call Green Waste Recovery at (831) 768-4750.

CAPITOLA TO BEGIN GENERAL PLAN UPDATE

beginning an important process to update its General Plan. The update process will be a two or three year endeavor and the City for the General Plan Update is currently planned for March 2010. will be reaching out to the community for help in creating this plan. The City is currently is seeking people interested in serving on the General Plan Advisory Committee (GPAC).

The General Plan establishes the City's policies relating to development and conservation within Capitola. Capitola's current General Plan was adopted by the City in 1989. While the General Plan has served the community well, it is outdated and does not adequately address many issues identified by residents.

Some of the key issues to address in the General Plan Update will be:

Enhancement of the 41st and Bay Avenue commercial corridors;

Parking and hotel development in the Village; and

Promoting environmental and economic sustainability.

The General Plan Update process will also include the preparation of a Climate Action Plan, a Green Jobs Analysis, an updated Local Coastal Program, and an updated Zoning Code. The combination of the update will result in a new vision and strategy to address the needs of the community.

For the first time in more than 20 years, the City of Capitola is Throughout the process, the City will host meetings and workshops to obtain public input on key issues. The first public workshop Information about General Plan Update events will be posted on the project website, www.plancapitola.com. The City will also share information with residents through email updates, direct mailings, and other outreach materials.

> The General Plan Advisory Committee will include eleven members, representing key stakeholders and all geographic areas of the city, who will help guide the preparation of the General Plan Update. All Capitola residents, regardless of previous experience serving on City committees, are encouraged to apply. The deadline is January 10, 2011, and the City Council is expected to appoint the GPAC members on January 27, 2011.

WHY WAS A POLICE CAR IN MY NEIGHBORHOOD?

Do you ever wonder why the police officers were in your neighborhood? Now you can go online most weekdays and find out! The Police Department releases certain "Calls for Service" information in print form, some of which is never heard over the police band radio or police scanners.

Report summaries that the Capitola Police Officers have responded to as calls for service are posted on the Internet HYPERLINK wwwci.capitola.ca.us. Reports are generated by our computer aided dispatch software, and contain the basic information that a dispatcher might see or take from a caller. Our clerks remove inappropriate information before posting a series of PDFs each weekday before the noon hour.

This information is not posted "live as it happens" because of the need to keep some investigations and information confidential, as well as juvenile names, certain numbers, etc. This necessitates the review of each call for service by the clerical staff at the Police Department before posting. The PDF reports are only posted to the Internet when the clerks are working, so you should not expect to find new postings on the weekends or holidays. This documentation that is now being posted should give the reader an idea of the activities that the Police Department is handling, and more specifically, what is happening in certain areas of our community at a certain time. When combined with the HYPERLINK www.crimereports.com link on the City of Capitola Internet site, HYPERLINK www.ci.capitola.ca.us, readers should have a comprehensive view of police activity in Capitola. This view does not contain activity that happened outside the city limits of Capitola, such as in Live Oak, Soquel, Aptos, Cabrillo College, etc.

Reference numbers are attached to each incident, should you desire to contact a detective or sergeant for additional details. Please go to the URL HYPERLINK www.ci.capitola.ca.us/ and look to the bottom of the page for the link on the right side near the CrimeReports.com map.

WHARF ROAD MURAL

The Wharf Road Mural which showcases an iconic view of Capitola was recently completed by local artist, John Ton. The mural was funded by the Public Art fund which is collected from a fee on commercial development to place public art throughout the City. Mr. Ton was selected after a comprehensive search process last summer by an Artist Selection Panel composed of local residents, artists, and Art & Cultural Commission representatives. The mural features a familiar view of the Venitians, Stockton Bridge, and lots of begonias. The Art & Cultural Commission meetings are open to the public, they meet the second Tuesday of the month at 6:30 in City Hall. Future Art Projects along the 41st Ave. corridor will be considered in January, please attend the meetings if you are interested in participating.

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TREE AND FOREST MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE

In January 2004 the City Council adopted the Community Tree and Forest Management Ordinance noting that trees are a valuable asset that enhance property values and make the City a more attractive place to visit and do business. The purpose of the ordinance is to establish a program to protect trees to create a sustained community forest within the City of Capitola.

Recently, trees have been removed without permits and in violation of the City's Tree Ordinance. Significant civil penalties have been collected and several cases are pending.

Trees help define the character of the City.

Tree Permits are required for the following tree work: Pruning, trimming, removing, and/or performing

any work, on a single occasion or cumulatively, over a three-year period, affecting 25% or more of the crown and/or volume of foliage and branches of any tree with a minimum six-inch truck measured forty-eight inches above existing grade or at average breast height, and trees located within an environmentally sensitive habitat area.

The permit process entails submitting an application and fees to the Community Development Department, a staff site inspection and, if the following findings can be made for removal, then a permit is issued:

- 1. Tree removal is in the public interest based on one of the following: The health or condition of the tree, with respect to disease infestation or danger of falling; safety considerations; or where a tree has caused, or has the potential to cause, unreasonable property damage with existing utility services;
- 2. All possible and feasible alternatives to tree removal have been evaluated, including, but not limited to undergrounding of utilities, selective root cutting, trimming and relocation;
- 3. The Type, size and schedule for planning replacement trees are specified and shall be concurrent with the tree removal;
- 4. The tree removal would not be contrary to the purposes of the Community Tree and Forest Management Ordinance;
- 5. Replacement trees in a ratio of two to one shall maintain a canopy coverage of at least fifteen percent.

The effective date of the permit is ten working days following approval unless appealed. If findings cannot be made, then staff may require the applicant to provide a written evaluation and recommendations prepared by a certified arborist. The Community Development Director will make a determination which can be appealed to the Planning Commission.

As a reminder, trees illegally trimmed, pruned or removed are subject to civil penalties and liens. Before you do any tree work, call Community Development at 831.475.7300 to verify if you need a permit, your selected tree company has a valid CA D-49 license and a current business license to perform work within the city. The City of Capitola is committed to protecting Capitola's urban forest and the program helps ensure that the City will have a healthy urban forest for future generations.

ATTENTION APARTMENT MANAGERS!

Ecology Action is looking for apartment complexes in Capitola interested in improving their recycling: Free Materials and **Assistance Provided!**

Apartment facilities all across the Monterey Bay Area are enrolling in a program to establish comprehensive recycling in order to reduce waste going to the landfill. The City of Capitola is partnering with Ecology Action, a local nonprofit environmental organization, to roll out a recycling program to apartment complexes in Capitola.

This free program starts with a site visit to establish trash and recycling service levels appropriate for your complex. This initial visit is then followed by one-on-one outreach to residents that provide them with all the information and motivation they need to increase their recycling levels along with free bins to use for collecting their recyclables. These free materials and services are provided at no cost to the site.

The Ecology Action team and our grant partners working on this project have found that the one-on-one education to residents is the best way to increase recycling. The estimated amount of money spent on education, equipment and materials per facility is approximately \$3,000 depending on the size of the facility. All this is free to you and has already helped participating sites increase their ability to recycle an additional 490 tons per year.
