Remote Access to Council Meetings

In accordance with the Shelter in Place Order from the Santa Cruz County Health Officer, and Executive Orders by the State Governor, City Council meetings are currently not physically open to the public. To maximize public safety while still maintaining transparency and public access, members of the public can watch meetings live online by clicking on "Meeting Agendas/Videos" on the City website homepage, or live on Spectrum Cable Television channel 8. Past meetings remain available to watch on CityofCapitola.org at any time. Meeting agendas for public viewing are now posted in the Capitola Village Kiosk and outside City Hall's front lobby.

As always, the public can send emails to citycouncil@ci.capitola.ca.us to comment on agenda items prior to Council meetings taking place. The public can also mail or drop off written comments to the "after hours drop off" box at City Hall.

To comment during a Council meeting, please email publiccomment@ci.capitola.ca.us including the agenda item in the subject line. Emails received during the public comment period for any agenda item will be read for up to three minutes and shown on a screen.

Eviction Moratorium Passed by Council

Over the past few weeks, many cities, including Capitola, adopted ordinances prohibiting residential and/ or commercial evictions while the Governor's stay at home Order is in place. On March 26, Capitola adopted its Ordinance which prohibited residential and commercial evictions for financial reasons related to COVID-19.

On April 6, the Judicial Council, the rulemaking arm of the California court system, issued eleven temporary emergency rules. Emergency Rule 1 prohibits any California court from issuing a summons on any unlawful detainer (eviction) lawsuit unless the Court finds that the eviction is necessary to further public health and safety.

The rule is in effect until 90 days after the Governor's stay at home order is lifted. As written, this rule appears to apply to commercial and residential evictions for reasons other than COVID-19. Emergency Rule 2 stays all foreclosures. also unless the Court finds they are required to further public health and safety, for the same time period. The effect of these rules is that residential and commercial evictions and foreclosures, unless they are necessary to further public health and safety, are prohibited from now until 90 days after the Governor lifts the stay at home Order.

Short-Term-Rental Rules Under Health Order

On April 2, the County of Santa Cruz issued guidance about how short-term rental property owners should comply with the Health Agency's Shelter in Place Order. The guidance applies to all vacation rentals in the County, including Capitola, and applies to hotels, bed and breakfast establishments, Airbnb, VRBO, and other platforms. Short-term rentals are not considered essential businesses and therefore must close unless they are being used for the following purposes:

- Providing housing for traveling emergency, medical, and public safety personnel
- Providing housing for other essential workers
- Providing housing for families attending to the critical medical needs of local relatives

Vacation rentals should not be used by their owners to shelter in place if they have to leave another county to come here. All vacation bookings not currently in effect should be cancelled through May 3, 2020. Current vacation rental occupants are encouraged to return home unless they have no other place to go or are unable to safely travel.
